Embracing the Future

The story of the Franciscan Sisters of the Eucharist begins with the request from the Second Vatican Council to religious communities to return to the spirit of their founders. Two exceptional women responded to this call.

In 1973 Mother Rosemae Pender, Foundress, and Mother Shaun Vergauwen, Co-Foundress, along with others from the Franciscan Sisters of Perpetual Adoration of La Crosse, Wisconsin, became the first Franciscan Sisters of the Eucharist. These Sisters wanted a strong community life, centered on prayer and common apostolates. Mother Rosemae and Mother Shaun led the Community to renew religious life in the Church.

Mother Rosemae and Mother Shaun served as Mother General and Vicar General from the Community's beginning until 2005. At that time, Mother Shaun Vergauwen was elected Mother General and Mother Miriam Seiferman was elected Vicar General.



Mother Shaun Vergauwen, a licensed marriage and family therapist, founded the Franciscan Life Center, Meriden, Connecticut, in 1974. The Franciscan Life Center is a non-profit mental health center licensed by the State of Connecticut. The Franciscan Life Center Network has grown into an international network of eleven centers serving the particular needs of the people in each location.

The Franciscan Sisters of the Eucharist is an order of religious women dedicated to the sacredness of human life from conception to natural death. They live the vows of chastity, poverty and obedience to Christ and His Church. Women from all over the United States, Italy (3), the Philippines (3), Canada (1) and Kenya (1) have answered Christ's call to become Franciscan Sisters of the Eucharist. The Community is blessed to have 15 young women in various stages of formation.

On June 26, 2016, Mother Rosemae passed away unexpectedly during the Mass for her 75th jubilee. Mother Rosemae will always be remembered as the rock of the Foundation. Her love of and dedication to the Church, her wisdom and perception, and her care for individuals' particular needs are some of her special qualities.

The Franciscan Sisters of the Eucharist are embracing the future in faith and hope as Mother Rosemae lived her life.

she obtained her Masters in Marriage and Family Therapy. Throughout her studies she has been working at Yale University as a coordinator in the psychology department. Deb passed her Marriage and Family licensure exam in 2016.

Faith has always been a big part of Deb's life. She believes God led her to work at the Franciscan Life Center and added that she feels very blessed to be a member of the staff.

Deb's future aspirations include working with engaged couples. She believes there is a real need to better prepare young people for the vocation of marriage.

The Vocation Story of Sister Regina Cochran, F.S.E.

Sister Regina, born and raised in Baton Rouge, Louisiana, graduated from a Baptist high school where she learned what it meant to follow Christ. After graduation she attended Louisiana State University and was a practice player with the Lady Tigers basketball team. During college her faith was nurtured by attending different non-denominational churches.

For eight consecutive summers Sister Regina worked at Camp Kahdalea in Brevard, North Carolina. Sister Regina enjoyed mountain biking while completing her Bachelor's Degree in Business and Outdoor Education.

While working at the camp, Sister Regina met young Catholic adults. She saw them alive with their faith. As these friendships developed Sister Regina realized God was leading her to enter the Catholic Church. "On July 4, 1999, I found my true freedom in the One, Holy, Catholic, and Apostolic Church," said Sister Regina.

After her conversion to Catholicism, two of Sister Regina's closest friends entered consecrated life which made her aware of the possible vocation. "However, I was such a young Catholic that it was not time for me to realize that call. A few years later I wanted to know what God wanted from me so I promised God I would go to Mass everyday for Lent. When it was over, I was still not clear. I prayed, 'Please show me the Community you have in mind for me.'"

When Sister Regina met the Franciscan Sisters of the Eucharist through a woman whom she had worked with at Camp Kahdalea, she was "attracted to the Franciscan Sisters of the Eucharist because of their deep relationships with each other and with those they serve. They wore a habit and were faithful to the Church's teachings. I began to pray that God would open the door if it was what He wanted. After my first visit to the Franciscan Sisters of the Eucharist,

I prayed, 'God, I do not know if you are calling me to religious life but, if you are, let this be the community.'"

Other aspects of the Community's life which attracted Sister Regina were attending daily Mass and meals together. "The Community was very active and each Sister had a profession."



"The discovery of my call to religious life did not contain too many magical moments. God spoke to me in ordinary ways through people I trusted. As my relationship grew with the Franciscan Sisters of the Eucharist, I realized God was calling me to be a part of this beautiful community and I desired to say yes to serve Christ in His Church. In following God's will for my life I am able to accomplish the dreams that have always been deep within me." Sister Regina added, "In the spirit of Saint Francis, we desire to bring a deep awareness of the beauty and integrity in each person we encounter."

Sister Regina earned a Master's Degree in Dogmatic Theology from Holy Apostles College and Seminary, in Cromwell, Connecticut, and made her final vows as a Franciscan Sister of the Eucharist on September 4, 2016. She taught high school religion for the Archdiocese of Hartford and is now working full time as the assistant vocation director for the Franciscan Sisters of the Eucharist. "Life is always full of new adventures when we follow God's will," stated Sister Regina.

Franciscan Home Care is celebrating 30 years as a full-service home health care agency this April

"There is no place like home!" – And there is no place like home when you are recovering from surgery or illness, or if you need health care support at end of life. Franciscan Home Care and Hospice Care was founded by the Franciscan Sisters of the Eucharist to provide these services. Franciscan Home Care, established in 1987, celebrates its 30th anniversary during this year. Sister Suzanne Gross, FSE, has served as the Administrator and did the foundational work with Sister Marcia Ternes, FSE, LCSW, who served as the licensed social worker. Sister Marcia had been doing home health care since the early 1970s. Today, the staff of 70 includes nurses, social workers, physical, speech and occupational therapists, and home health aides. Daily the agency serves more than 200 patients of all denominations, creeds, and socio-economic status *In the Spirit of Gentle Compassion*.

Celebrating 20 Years of Hospice Care

Franciscan Hospice Care, a program of Franciscan Home Care and Hospice Care, is celebrating 20 years of providing care to persons at the end of life. The agency strives to meet the spiritual and emotional needs of persons and to help them prepare for the final moments of earthly life and to ready them for eternal life. A team of caregivers, including nurses, social workers, pastoral care persons, a physician, a pharmacist, and hospice volunteers, support the dying person and the family in this process.

Franciscan Home Care and Hospice Care has implemented a relatively new therapy program based on the Lee Silverman voice treatment program. LSVT Big and LSVT Loud helps individuals with Parkinson's Disease and other neurological disorders improve mobility and speech. Physical and Occupational Therapists on staff have been certified in both LSVT Loud and LSVT Big. The LSVT program has been scientifically studied for over 20 years and has proven to be successful. Both therapeutic treatments are administered in the home by the staff. LSVT Big addresses the unique movement impairments for people with neurological disorders and LSVT Loud improves vocal loudness and voice quality.

The John Lateran Center: A House of Formation

The John Lateran Center on Allen Avenue in Meriden has been undergoing a physical transformation for the past 16 months - an addition to the home for the young women entering the Franciscan Sisters of the Eucharist. The addition will provide a place for them to pray, meet and share meals together.

The formation of each Sister takes place at the John Lateran Center where the young women learn the traditions and customs of the Franciscan Sisters of the Eucharist. Formation helps each Sister find her place within the Franciscan Community. The potential to live as a woman given to God through the Community is realized and brought forth during formation.



Each woman begins to express her own charism under the guidance of the Community. Over time, each Sister lives more fully the principles, charism, and mission of the Community.

The Formation House provides a secure, enclosed space which is integral for the Sisters to grow. Formation is comprised of stages – Postulancy, Novitiate, Temporary Profession, and Perpetual Profession. With each subsequent step, the Sister learns more about the Community in a radical way of life, counter cultural to the ways of the world.

The formation process, like the building project, can seem long. This process of formation is a beautiful gift to the Sister, to the Community, and to the Church. As with a building process, formation begins with taking a risk and accepting the surprises of the end result. As it unfolds, the beauty begins to be revealed.
